SKILLS NEEDED FOR AFTER HIGH SCHOOL....

In addition to choosing a postsecondary education or training option, your child will also need to develop specific skills to prepare for this journey after high school. For example:

- If your child decides to attend college and live away from home, organization and time management may be a challenge.
- Your child will need to learn to understand his or her disability, know the accommodations needed to address the disability in a postsecondary setting, and have the self-advocacy skills needed to request and obtain those accommodations.





Groups working on housing and adult living

ARCHway ARCHway describes itself as offering a roadmap to help families use person-centered planning to create quality living arrangements. It is a project of the Foundation for Autism Support and Training. Autism Housing Pathways is the Massachusetts affiliate of ARCHway.

<u>Bittersweet Farms</u> The granddaddy of all farmsteads, Bittersweet has been serving adults in Ohio since the 1970s. It is the model for SAGE Crossing Foundation.

Center for Independent Futures This Illinois group works with families to create options for community living. They have a strong relationship with a Massachusetts organization, TILL. Center for Independent Futures has developed a tool to assess readiness for independent living.
